

BRITISH TRADEMARKS of the 1920s & 1930s

The trademarks in this collection represent some of the finest graphic design to emanate from Britain between the wars. Author John Mendenhall has gathered over 280 trademarks and logos from the archives of the British Library and categorized them by subject. From the carefree exuberance of the twenties to the back-to-work ethic of the thirties, these trademarks reflect the moods and successes of industry prior to World War II and the advent of diversified, multinational conglomerates.

This book will serve as an inspiration for designers and commercial artists seeking source material beyond the abstract designs of the past twenty years and will fascinate anyone with its unique and often humorous glimpse back to a more innocent era in British life.

As time progresses and design once again reflects a more humanized approach to communication, these simple trademarks can act as guideposts to a new age of company and product identity.

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Introduction

The earliest British trademarks, dating from the 15th Century, were merchants' marks used in commerce and trade. Applied to articles offered for sale, these symbols generally consisted of a monogram or emblem, often combined with a visual pun of the individual's name. A variety of craftsmen, from stone mason to goldsmith, utilized these marks to authenticate the source of origin.

In the 1600s, as travelling merchants were replaced by fixed houses of trade, their marks of identification were substituted by shop signboards. At first these signs consisted of simple pictorial representations of the trade carried on within: a knife for a cutler or a hand for a glover. As time progressed and business became more competitive, the imagery became more complex. In 1803 a traveller wrote about London:

"As it is one of the secrets of the trade to attract the attention of that tide of people which is constantly ebbing and flowing in the streets, it may easily be conceived that great pains are taken to give a striking form to the signs and devices hanging out before their shops."

In true competitive fashion, shops, inns and taverns consistently attempted to outdo their rivals, often with imaginative results. The Cat in the Basket signboard used by a merchant on the Thames actually consisted of a living cat hanging in a basket above the shop. It was quickly copied by other merchants, forcing the shop owner to label his as the Original Cat in the Basket. Humor and satire were typically an undercurrent, if not the intent, in many signboard designs. The Hog in Armour, Puss in Boots (later the Jackass in Boots) and the Ape and Bagpipes were all sign illustrations reflecting the humor of animals performing human actions or dressed in human garments.

Just as with merchants' marks, puns on a proprietor's name were commonplace, such as with a picture of a *Hand and Cock* for a shop owned by a Mr. Hancock. When a tobacconist named Farr used the advertising slogan "Finest Tobacco by Farr" on his tobacco papers and shop signboard, he was not only describing the quality of his tobacco but successfully expressing his tongue-in-cheek sense of humor. This unique British wit is a common theme throughout subsequent decades of trademark design.

The printed trade card, forerunner of today's business card, was popularized throughout the 19th Century. Besides carrying the name and address of the merchant, an advertising illustration similar to that used on signboards was incorporated into the design. Great progress was being made in manufacturing industries during the 1800s, and it was com-

mon at this time for many of these companies to develop some sort of identifying mark. Typically these were simply pictures of the product the industry produced, reflecting a thriving export trade to non-English speaking countries. The illustration was readily understood without typography. For the home market, ornamental lettering was added, often in conjunction with engraved borders of flowery decoration. While reflecting the high point of Victorian design, these trademarks were rarely remarkable.

As industry flourished, the need became apparent for a method of registering the identifying marks of a growing number of competing industries. The Trade Marks Act of 1875 initiated a system of registration whereby a manufacturer could make exclusive claim to marks appearing on mass-produced goods. These were published in the *Trade Marks Journal*, which has appeared regularly since May 3, 1876.

With the rise in popularity of packaged goods in retail trade, entire label designs were often registered as trademarks to prevent copying by competitors. Many were labels for patent medicines and food, bearing the signature of a real (or presumably real) individual who attested to the product's authenticity. This use of hand-rendered typography as a unique identifying mark for a company or product has become a traditional device in trademark design.

Interestingly, some of the labels which appeared in the first volume of the *Trade Marks Journal* are for goods still in use

today. The "Bass Ale" and "Lea and Perrin's Worcestershire Sauce" labels are the most notable examples, having undergone little change over the past century.

By 1900 the number of trademarks registered per year had reached 10,000. Besides marks and labels, advertisements for a variety of goods were registered. Reflecting the advancement of new industries, products depicted broadened to include motorcars, electric lamps, telegraphic instruments, typewriters and talking machines. With the perfection of engraving and printing technology, the pictorial designs became more complex, as well as generally poorer in quality. It wasn't until the 1920s that British trademark designers were capable of achieving a clarity of form and simplicity of message which would elevate their work above that of ordinary drawing.

A number of factors were responsible for effecting this shift in direction. Foremost was the promotion of good design in Britain during the first two decades of this century. One individual, more than any other, championed good design as being good for business.

Frank Pick, working as managing director of the Underground Group of Companies, ranked publicity as integral to the "public face" of an organization, and the pictorial poster as a key method of promotion. From 1912 onward, Pick hired talented British designers, as well as the young American Edward McKnight Kauffer, to design posters for the London Underground subway system.

In 1916 he commissioned the calligrapher Edward Johnston to design a completely new alphabet for London Transport. Originally intended as a poster typeface, it was quickly adopted for all official London Transport communications, including signs and notices. Johnston redesigned the Underground symbol in 1935, adapting the wheel mark of the original General Omnibus Company.

The English revival of excellence in printing and typography at this time facilitated the spread of quality design into advertising and industry. Harold Curwen, founder of the Curwen Press at Plaistow, was one of the first to employ commercial artists to upgrade all aspects of publicity emanating from his shop. Stanley Morison, working as an advisor to the Monotype Corporation, revived classical typefaces such as Baskerville, Garamond and Bembo, while at the same time promoted the contemporary typefaces Perpetua and Times New Roman. Numerous private presses and commercial printers throughout England restored a sense of elegance and refinement to the graphics of this era.

Advertising agencies recognized the positive impact on sales which clarity in design could achieve. Not oblivious to the excellence of the London Transport posters with which their clients' publicity would have to compete, a shift occurred away from the previously popular Victorian illustrative style. Such notable designers as Tom Purvis and Clive Gardner were commissioned by the W.S. Crawford agency, among others, to create compellingly modern poster images.

This new sophistication in design was developing elsewhere in Europe. Germans were making great progress in the area of trademark design; their work in the 1920s is particularly notable for its severe, uncluttered geometry. The stark creations of men such as Karl Schulpig influenced a generation of British designers who were introduced to these new methods of expression via advertising and print journals.

The trademark designs emanating from Britain during the 1920s generally did not attain the level of severity of their German counterparts, in part reflecting the differences in the two societies. The British symbols are best described as humane; while German designers emphasized form, British designers stressed content.

Sadly, most of these trademark designers worked in anonymity as staff or freelance artists in the employ of job printers and advertising agencies. One individual who did receive widespread recognition was Reynolds Stone, a graduate apprentice in 1931 at the Cambridge University Press. Working briefly for Eric Gill, he learned how to engrave in wood. From 1934 on, Stone specialized as an engraver, cutting letterheads and bookplates for private patrons.

It was at this time that he entered the area of trademark design, creating symbols for publishers, printers and paper merchants. His work encompassed numerous graphic design projects, from wine labels to book illustrations, all utilizing the precise cutting of typography and image in wood. It was the successful use of engraving by Stone and others which led

to the popularization of scratchboard and linocuts by so many commercial artists in the 1930s.


The expressive nature of publicity during this decade of economic depression can be attributed in part to the migration of fine artists into the service of industry. Due to the adverse economy, painters, sculptors and printmakers sought employment in the design professions. This era, prior to England's involvement in the war, is characterized by a blurring of the distinctions between fine and commercial art. As a result, the graphic imagery emanating from the 1930s is notable for its remarkable strength and competency.

Professor Richard Guyatt, in a lecture at the Royal College of Art in 1950, analyzed this quality in design as the distinction of "head, heart and hand." The head provides the logic, the heart gives the emotional stimulus to the design and the hand actually gives it its form. These three factors are so interrelated that the viewer is unaware of them in a successful design.

The "head, heart and hand" are certainly in evidence in the designs presented in this collection. Highlighting the best of British trademarks of the 1920s and 1930s, these symbols are a footnote to English society: its dignity and determination, respect for the past and faith in the future. Rarely in the fifty years that followed did trademarks exhibit such a refreshing sense of personality.
