

SIGNPOSTS OF HISTORY

he worst thing about elementary school was being forced to learn "important" dates. Ah, the tricks we students had to play to remember the blasted things, such as the ditty: "In 1492 Columbus sailed the ocean blue." Although this particular event is forever etched in my mind, I still can't remember when the Magna Carta was signed (12-something, right?) or when the Gettysburg Address was delivered (it wasn't 1865, was it? No, that was the year of Abe Lincoln's assassination). Thanks to a popular song of my childhood I do know that "In 1814 we took a little trip, along with Colonel Jackson down the mighty Missisip . . ." but I'm not certain why.

What was so important about knowing dates anyway? Isn't it more meaningful to understand the reasons for the Magna Carta or the implications of the Gettysburg Address? Which, incidentally, I didn't grasp at the time because I was too busy trying to memorize dates. Learning these numerals was a mechanical function of rote education. Sure, dates were necessary in placing historical events in chronological context, but memorizing them as an end in and of itself did precious little to encourage one's concern for or pleasure in the relevancy of the past. What's more, not all the dates that I was given to memorize were accurate anyway. Come on, Jesus wasn't really born on December 25, was he?

Nonetheless, dates are indeed the signposts of history. In fact, too many young students today do not know which came first, the American Revolution or the Civil War—unlike the two twentieth century world wars (or Super Bowls), they are not followed by numbers. But even with these numerical designations, many pupils falter when asked exactly during which timeframe the wars were fought. Or, for that matter, what year the Russian Revolution began, the United States dropped the first Abomb on Japan, John Glenn first orbited the earth, or President Kennedy and Martin Luther King Jr. were assassinated. Of course, knowing dates alone is not going to increase intellectual rigor, but at least dates provide grounding.

Nonetheless, by high school I was so turned off by the way dates were force-fed that I simply ignored them (just as I reflexively skipped over italicized passages of texts because I believed whatever was set in italic was extraneous). But at a certain point (though the date escapes me) I had something of a revelation. It came in the form of a book called Flight, one of those American Heritage tomes published in the mid-1960s, which, like comparable Time-Life books on eras and events, were the Ken and Ric Burns documentaries of their day. In Flight I was first introduced to a "timeline" which juxtaposed dates in relation to other dates. But these were not mere numbers detached from meaning, rather they were markers along a continuum of time and place. In fact, under each year there were brief texts that gave a concise narrative about the legacy of flight. Although to thoroughly understand how manned flight evolved from biplanes to supersonic aircraft required a closer reading, the timeline summarily covered many milestones in less than half the reading time. The timeline also was the glue that bonded the raw data together. From that moment on I became something of a timeline junkie.

A timeline is an index of facts. Yet it can be much richer than a terse summary. Although timelines filter out most verbiage leaving only the salient points behind, this veritable mainline of pure information can be quite pleasurable to read, particularly in the age of information overload. A timeline is indeed viable for detailed narratives, as in museum or gallery exhibitions where lengthy copy challenges a reader's tolerance. Of course, a timeline is, by definition, economical, but not all timelines need be reduced to a few pages. Obviously, the one you are about to read is rather extensive.

The idea to publish a book-length timeline comes from what I perceive is a lack in graphic design history courses of a simple tool which would succinctly outline the events that have shaped the broad field of visual communication. In recent years, although there has been a marked increase in design history curricula, owing to limited budgets and time constraints, these have mostly been general surveys that last a semester or less. However, even the skimpiest overview of movements, styles, and personalities require considerable time to impart and absorb. So this timeline is designed to complement the survey class by highlighting significant (and sometimes forgotten) events, works, and people and enabling students to view them as components of a great continuum. The timeline does not replace broader

anecdotal or critical narratives, but rather serves as a study guide that supplements the organization of history into accessible units.

Another motive for developing this book is that in writing graphic design history, referencing dates is an invariably arduous yet necessary task. Perhaps this compilation will help the neophyte scholar, as well as the casual student, find his or her way through the morass of historical detail by providing an "at-a-glance" sketch of the intersection between graphic design, mass media, popular culture, technology, and world events. Indeed, the entries on this timeline are both related and disparate, but when read in conjunction with more detailed historical analyses, they provide insight into graphic design's cultural role.

This timeline ostensibly examines the nexus where the graphic design legacy parallels and intersects kindred arts and other cultural manifestations throughout the twentieth century. Although the first section addresses developments prior to this timeframe (1890–1899), graphic design came of age as a discrete commercial art during the 1900s. It further was adapted by other visual arts during this time and split off into numerous subsets and genres. This timeline is, therefore, based on an admittedly catholic view of graphic design that extends beyond typography and layout into visual and textual communications of numerous kinds.

For example, advertising, which is tainted by hucksterism, has long been at odds with so-called pure graphic design. However, graphic design has played an important role in the arts of persuasion throughout the century, especially in the United States. Hence included are many entries about the development of advertising campaigns, slogans, trademarks, and agencies. Modern art movements, particularly in Europe, have borrowed from advertising design and, in turn, influenced typography; hence, the abundance of entries on this subject. The timeline is admittedly centered on Western developments (although the formation of the commercial arts in China and Japan are accounted for). It is important to focus on the wellsprings of Western graphic design and advertising, owing to the birth of industrialization and commercialization in these regions, and yet it is imperative to cover events and individuals that held sway in other cultures.

Not only is this a straightforward directory of facts—births, deaths, premieres, foundings, closings, etc.—this timeline is also a miscellany of curious arcana, small blips that have nonetheless had impact on the design legacy. There is no attempt, however, to distinguish between acknowledged major events and presumably minor occurrences because each has its own inherent significance. Juxtaposing the origin of a major typeface, for example, next to a lesser alphabet does not diminish the importance of the latter but reveals the level of creative production at a particular time. And who can argue with the contention that, seen in the context of the past and the future, minor inventions or events can prove to be the precursors of major developments in history? This book aspires to be more than a record, it should be a stimulus for further discovery.

The timeline does not endeavor to sum up each and every decade as though every ten years is a clearly defined package. Graphic design is influenced and characterized, in part, by certain consequential events, such as war, economic depression, technological progression, etc., but these are not neatly confined to five or ten year categories. During war there may be a surge in propaganda (which is reflected herein), but this endeavor continues long afterward. The Modern movement, for example, emerged over a period of time beginning in the early twentieth century, but it did not precipitously cease the instant the term "Postmodernism" was coined. Entries, therefore, address the overlapping nature of visual communications as a way of showing that history is not as neatly organized as the history books make it appear.

Yet in a field that did not earnestly begin to chronicle its own history until fairly recently, providing an accurate picture has not been easy. While every attempt has been made to track down viable data and unambiguous dates, accuracy is allusive. Paradoxically, many of the most common graphic design signposts point in different directions. While dates are clearly written on numerous artifacts, there are also many undated relics that lead researchers to countless inconsistencies. Individual memories are often fuzzy as well, and even presumably definitive resources are sometimes suspect. For this book, determining dates involved referencing primary and secondary sources—respectively, the individuals who made history and the history books, archives, and Web sites that have chronicled them. The most profound realization was finding that miscalculations could come from the horses' own mouths. Sometimes the experts and creators can be one or many years off. So we apologize in advance for any mistakes and welcome rectification.

This timeline is a record in the making, a starting point for an even more inclusive compilation. Additional suggestions are indeed welcome. For now, this is but a basic guide; through future revisions, however, it will become a definitive one.

Primarily an architectural, decorative, and graphic arts style, Art Nouveau is noted for its use of flowing, curvilinear lines, organic shapes, and sensuous female figures. Influences of the style are felt in architecture, furniture, product and apparel design, and in graphics and typography.
- ★ Charles R. Ashbee forms the Essex House Press. Editorial cartoons become regular features in American newspapers and continue to grow in popularity throughout the decade.
- ★ Walt McDougall fathers the editorial cartoon as a regular feature for the New York World.
- ★ William Pickering becomes the publisher of the Chiswick Press, England. Chiswick concentrates on composition and illustration of books rather than printing process, and begins the transformation of the visual communications field by distinguishing between printer and designer.







S PREPARATIONS WERE BEING made in all parts of the World to send exhibits to the International Exposition at Leipzig for Book Industries and Graphic Arts, there was brought very sharply into notice the lack of an organization in the United States which looks after the interests of those con-

nected with the Graphic Arts.

We have an extraordinary number of printers and publishers, etchers and engravers, men engaged in the paper and ink industries, artists and men of business who care for the graphic arts, but they have had no society, club or institute for a place of meeting, or an exchange where their several interests might be discussed.

Realization of this gap in our art societies led a number of gentlemen to plan the founding of an Institute of the Graphic Artsatonce. Messrs Wm.B. Howland, Alexander W. Drake, John G. Agar, John Clyde Oswald and Charles de Kay were the first movers to this end. The Institute was incorporated and the following officers elected:





How can man get into harmony with his surroundings when he is constantly altering them? The future of our race is, in this direction, more unpleasant than we care to admit, and it has sometimes seemed to me that its best chance lies through apathy, uninventiveness, and inertia.

- ★ Herbert L. Block, editorial cartoonist for the Washington Post, sets the standard for this genre of cartooning, coins the term "McCarthyism," and eventually creates memorable caricatures of McCarthy, as well as the A- and H-bombs.
- ★ International graphic or Swiss typographic style takes hold through the 1950s, its roots are in *De Stijl* and the Bauhaus.

- ★ Ladislav Sutnar coauthors with Knud Lonberg-Holm and designs Catalog Design Progress for the Sweet's Catalog Service, exhibiting ways that common information (i.e., plumbing supplies) can be both logically and aesthetically designed for quick access (prefigures the interest in information architecture).
- ★ Leo Lionni, coeditor of *Print* magazine until 1951, writes a regular feature of design miscellany called "The Lion's Tail."
- ★ Max Huber, Swiss designer based in Italy, creates covers for the magazines Arbiter and Jazztime, combining photomontage and layering type, which prefigures Postmodern approaches.
- ★ Mort Walker, comic-strip artist, creates "Beetle Bailey," a satire of military life.
- ★ Morton Goldsholl, Chicago designer, designs books for Paul Theobald and the Martin-Senour Paint Company. He also develops the corporate identity program for Kimberly-Clarke Paper Company and H.U.H. Hoffman Company through the 1950s.
- ★ Otl Aicher, German designer and typographer, cofounds the Institute of Design in Ulm, Germany, which proffers a rational and scientific approach to graphic, product, and industrial design.


