



GENERAL INFORMATION. C26

Duties and Authority of Superintendent. DEPT.

SEC. 526. [Political Code.] It is the duty

of the superintendent of state printing:

One—To print the laws, including initiative measures adopted by the people, prefixing to the text of each act the date of approval or adoption and the date of going into effect of such act; the journals of the legislature; reports of state officers; public documents ordered to be printed by the legislature; blanks for the officers and departments of the state government; bills, resolutions, and other printing which may be ordered by either of the two houses of the legislature, and all other public printing for the state, unless otherwise expressly ordered by law.

Two—To publish, prefixed to each volume of the statutes, the constitution of the state and the name and place of residence of the governor and other executive officers of the state, lieutenant governor, senators and members of the assembly, the presiding officers of the senate and assembly, and of the commissioners of the state of California residing out of the state and in office at the time of such publication; the certificate of the secretary of state showing what acts, or sections or parts of acts, of the legislature are delayed from going into effect by a referendum petition properly certified and filed in his office; and the certificate of the secretary of state showing the result of any election upon any question submitted to the electors of the state within two years next preceding by either initiative or referendum petition.

Three—To perform the duties required by the provisions of article twelve, chapter two, title one, part three, of this code, and such other

duties as are imposed upon him by law.

Four—He shall keep in his office, open to public inspection, a time book, containing the name of every employee connected with the state printing office, the time employed, the rate of wages, and amount paid; and he shall certify, under oath, to the correctness of all claims for services rendered and materials furnished, which certificate shall be attached to and presented with each claim that shall be presented to the

state board of control for allowance, and no such claim shall be certified or allowed unless it

be fully itemized.

Five—He shall file in the office of the secretary of state, all proposals, bids, contracts, bonds, and other papers appertaining to the awarding of contracts now in his possession, or which may hereafter come into his possession, retaining in his office copies of the same; and the secretary of state shall promptly furnish the state board of control, for their use, cer-

tified copies of all such papers.

Six—All printing required by any of the state departments, boards, or any state officer, for the state, the order for the same shall be made out upon a printed blank, with voucher attached, to be furnished by the superintendent of state printing, and forwarded to the office of said superintendent, who shall enter upon a book kept in his office for that purpose, a transcript of said orders; and shall return with the work, when completed, to the person ordering the same, the original order, with duplicate voucher attached; said voucher to be signed by the person receiving the work, and returned to the superintendent of state printing, and both original and duplicate orders shall be kept on file in his office, and shall be a sufficient voucher for said work. The superintendent of state printing shall enter upon a book to be kept for said purpose, the name, quantity, and weight of paper used for each order printed. He shall also certify, under oath, that all materials, stock, and paper furnished the office under contracts, are of the quality, kind and weight required by such contracts, and no claim arising under any contract shall be allowed or paid unless accompanied by such certificate. He shall also, retain and file in his office one copy or sample of each blank, circular, pamphlet, book, legislative bili, file, or report, or any other work emanating from the state printing office, excepting blank books. of which he shall file only sample sheets, said copies or samples shall bear a uniform number and date with the voucher.

Seven—No printing for the senate or the assembly, or any committee of the same, shall be executed except upon an official order of the secretary or chief clerk respectively trans-

mitted to him.

Eight—The receipts of the respective sergeantat-arms or the secretary or chief clerk of the senate and assembly shall be a sufficient voucher to the superintendent of state printing for all

work done for either house.

Nine—To maintain a bill-filing room for the senate and assembly, to file all bills, resolutions. journals and such other papers as may be ordered by either the senate or assembly; to place all such bills, resolutions, journals and other papers in proper binders for the use of the members of the legislature, and to perform such other duties in connection with the filing and distribution of such bills, resolutions, journals and other papers as may be required by law, or the rules or special orders of either house of the legislature.

[Political Code.] The duties of the superintendent of state printing shall be as follows: He shall have the entire charge and superintendence of the state printing and binding. He shall take charge of and be responsible on his bond for all manuscripts and other matter which may be placed in his hands to be printed, bound, engraved, or lithographed, and shall cause the same to be promptly executed. He shall receive from the senate or assembly all matter ordered by either house to be printed and bound, or either printed or bound, and shall keep a record of the same, and of the order in which it may be received; and when the work shall have been executed, he shall deliver the finished sheets or volumes to the sergeant-atarms of the senate or assembly, or of any department authorized to receive them, whose receipt therefor shall be a sufficient voucher to the said superintendent of state printing for their delivery. He shall receive and promptly execute all orders for printing or binding required to be done for the various state officers.

Provided, that the said superintendent of state printing shall have discretionary authority to revise, reduce, or decline to execute any order, or part of any order, which in his judgment is unnecessary or unwarranted by law, and which will tend to unnecessarily consume the appropriation for support of the state printing office; and provided, further, that in the event of any state officer, board, commission, or state institution considering the decision of the

superintendent of state printing unfair, he may refer the matter to the state board of control, which board shall determine the matter. He shall employ such compositors, bookbinders, pressmen and assistants as the exigency of the work from time to time requires, and may at any time discharge such employees.

Provided, that at no time shall he pay said compositors, bookbinders, pressmen or assistants a lower rate of wages than the average wage paid by those employing such mechanics in Sacramento, San Francisco, Oakland and Los Angeles for like work. He shall at no time employ more compositors, bookbinders, pressmen or assistants than the absolute necessities of the state printing may demand, and he shall not permit any other than state work to be

done in the state printing office.

The superintendent of state printing shall. on or before the fifteenth day of September of each year, make a report, in writing, to the governor, embracing a record of the complete transactions of his office for the preceding fiscal year, which report shall show in detail all the items of expense attending the state printing and all the expenses of the office, including repairs and the purchase of materials of all kinds. Said report shall also state the number of reams and various kinds of paper delivered to him, and the amount and quality remaining on hand, which report shall be printed, biennially, for the use of the legislature.

SEC. 529. [Political Code.] The superintendent of state printing shall decide upon the style and manner of printing all laws and other

state documents.

(Preceding is "bill" style.)

"RUSH" JOBS.

Departments requesting that a job be "rushed" should bear in mind that all requisitions upon this department for printing and rubber stamps are submitted to the State Board of Control for approval before any expense is incurred in executing same. This submission to the board and return to this department requires from 24 to 48 hours.

Prompt attention is given all orders for printing, but it is only when the exigencies of the

case demand it that night or Sunday work is performed, as the latter adds materially to the cost, whether the job be large or small.

REPRINTS.

This department will endeavor to keep standing the type or plates for forms in common use in the various state offices, whenever in our judgment it would be of advantage to do so. This applies to forms of an intricate nature. All simple jobs, including pamphlet and book forms, are broken up immediately upon being printed, unless a request has been made by the department concerned to have the matter held for future publication. Such request should not be made later than the time of returning final "Author's Proof" and should state how long the matter is to be held. Do not ask to have type stored unless reasonably certain of a reprint. A small charge, sufficient to cover the actual cost of storage, will be made when a job is ordered held.

RUBBER STAMPS.

The state printing department is prepared to manufacture rubber stamps of every description required by state departments, and carries in stock a complete line of stamp pads, inks, rubber type, daters, numberers, time stamps, etc.

Rubber stamps and supplies may be purchased on the regular printing requisitions, which are in the possession of all state departments.

PRINTING FUNDS.

State departments in doubt as to balances in their respective printing funds may obtain this information by writing to the Superintendent

of State Printing.

It is suggested that where doubt exists as to availability of funds for a printing job of consequence, copy and complete specifications be submitted to this department with request for an approximate cost estimate of the completed job, which will be promptly furnished.

SUGGESTIONS TO AUTHORS.

To get correct printing at a minimum cost, begin with correct copy. Do not wait to see how the proof sheets look and then start editing.

This Style Book is intended to simplify and facilitate state printing, and authors are requested to prepare copy in consonance herewith, that best results may be attained and cost of printing kept to a minimum.

Copy should be typewritten, on sheets $S_{\frac{1}{2}}$ by 11 inches, or preferably $7_{\frac{1}{4}}$ by $S_{\frac{1}{2}}$ inches, and sent flat. When carbon copies are made, only

the originals should be sent to this office.

The size, $7\frac{1}{4}$ by $8\frac{1}{2}$ inches, is most convenient because it is the proper size for the copyboard of the linotype machine; any larger size has to be folded or cut, consuming time and increasing cost. It is also one-sixth of a sheet of folio, and will be supplied by this office to any author preparing copy for the state.

Write on one side of the paper only, and begin each page with a paragraph when convenient.

Typewriting should invariably be spaced, and no interlineations made, or inserts pinned or pasted on.

Proper names, foreign words or phrases, and all technical words should be written plainly and verified. Signatures and figures should be especially plain. Corrections should never be made by writing over the originals.

Abbreviations should never be made unless it

is intended they should be followed.

The frequent use of italic should be avoided, either for emphasis or where foreign words may

be Anglicized.

Photographs and drawings for illustrations should accompany the manuscript, bearing the figure or plate number, and the position of each indicated in the copy by such figure or plate number. The size of all cuts, maps, etc.. should be determined by this office in order that proper dimension and margination be secured.

When cuts are sent with manuscript, the figure or plate number should be plainly marked on the bottom of each.

Copy for the complete publication should be submitted at one time. It invariably delays printing to have copy arrive in installments. Begin with cover (if one is desired), and follow with *separate* copy for title page. The usual order is: Cover, title, table of contents, list of illustrations, list of plates or figures, letter of transmittal, introduction, text, and index.

When the index is elaborate, it may be compiled from page proofs; but preferably the skeleton copy for contents and index should accompany the manuscript. This is especially true of the contents, as the copy serves as a guide to the arrangement of the book, and is of value in determining the relative importance of the headings throughout.

Footnotes and references should be written at the bottom of the copy pages and as near to the subject matter as possible.

A letter of instruction should accompany the complete copy furnished, giving in detail the author's idea of the plan of the publication desired.

Samples furnished should be plainly marked, indicating what is desired to be followed in type, size, paper or binding.

Marking Proof.

This office will endeavor to send as clear proofs as may be made from the copy furnished, and all corrections should be made on such proofs submitted. Revised proofs will be sent when asked for. Avoid asking for page proofs when possible.

Answer all queries on proof, and make corrections on the margin of the sheet, opposite the errors occurring. Do not write over the print or between the lines.

Proofs should be marked to conform to the following style:

A line both above and below letters or words, and the marks repeated in the margin, denotes faulty alignment.

Ordinarily, one line drawn under a word indicates <u>italics</u>; two lines, <u>SMALL CAPS</u>; three lines, <u>CAPS</u>.

INSTRUCTIONS TO COMPOSING ROOM OPERATIVES.

Keeping Cost.

Every employee of the composing room is requested and expected to attach the fullest significance to the cost keeping system of the office. It is absolutely essential in order that all patrons of the state printing plant may be treated fairly and honestly.

To this end the job number becomes of paramount importance. See that it is correctly placed with every take slug, signature and form

number.

Especial care should be used in setting the

correct title of the job.

All take slugs should be set in 10-point, contain number and name of job, size and face of type, and name of the operator or compositor.

Signatures should be set in the following

form:

1-RR-19164.

Every insert or paster should bear the number of the job.

The closing mark (o) is highly important, and should be set when marked on copy.

Copy Editing.

Copy editors will endeavor to study the wishes of the author, and follow them, except when in

direct conflict with this Style Book.

Mark copy so that the compositor or operator will not be in doubt as to measure, slug, size and face of type, headings, indentions, dashes, new pages, captions, references, etc.

Copy must be edited in conformity with this

Style Book.

Composition.

Compositors and operators are directed to familiarize themselves with this book and observe carefully the rules governing composition.

Keep the proof sheets clean and avoid rolling

and wrinkling as much as possible.

When a run-over is made, indicate the lines reset by pencil mark; also type that has been

"pied" or reset on account of cold metal.

As a workman is judged by his product, see that the product is up to the standard, and use especial care in correcting and inserting slugs or type.

See that the correct job number is on each

proof, and sign all proofs corrected.

Reading and Copy Holding.

Speed is desirable and should be cultivated,

but accuracy is of first importance.

When the reader detects inconsistent and erroneous statements, obviously made by the writer through lapse of memory or slip of the

pen, it is his duty to query them.

When the grammatical construction of a paragraph is questioned by a reader and an element of doubt exists as to the propriety of changing its form, it should be marked with a capital "G" and a query mark inclosed in a ring. If a statement of fact is thought to be erroneous or is doubtful, it should be marked with a capital "F" and a query mark inclosed in a ring.

Queries inside a ring are not to be corrected, but are intended to go to the author. If it is desired to have a mark corrected and the query stand for the author, place query outside the ring. A mark queried without the ring would

have the same effect.

Proofs which are not clearly printed or which are in any manner defective should be refused.

Broken or defective figures or letters should

be obliterated and rewritten in a ring.

Upon the discovery of any wrong-font matrices, readers should cause immediate notice to be sent to the operator.

Readers should never make important changes in indentions or tables without consulting the

foreman of the proof room.

Readers will carefully note the instructions to compositors as to spacing, division of words, etc., and never hesitate to mark when work is imperfect.

The marks of the copy editor must be given consideration by all. He has probably handled the entire work, and is in a position to know more about its peculiarities than one who reads

but a small portion of it.

When reading avoid any unnecessarily loud tone of voice. Remember that small words are as important as large ones, and should be pronounced distinctly. Plurals should be clearly sounded.

The foreman of the proof room is authority for all matters pertaining to copy or proofs, together with the assignment of work to or

other disposition of the operatives.

Readers must not make changes from style or copy markings without consent of the foreman. If any change is made by him, readers should be notified at once,

Readers will not be permitted to confer or argue with compositors or operators regarding copy, or to argue among themselves over matters of style. Such questions shall be referred to the foreman.

All proofs must bear signature of reader, reviser and copyholder and will also carry the distinguishing "R" to indicate who read same. Readers must not handle proofs which do not bear the job number, title and compositor's name at the head of the galley; or at the bottom the signature of the operator setting corrections for revises, and the floorman making the corrections. This applies equally to stone proofs or proofs of any other nature.

Readers and copyholders will alternate in

reading by galleys whenever practicable.

Readers are required to give compositors the

benefit of all rings.

Quietude is required in the proof room, and there must be no indulging in conversation not pertaining to the work in hand. Courtesy between employees during office hours must be invariably observed. No other condition will be tolerated.

All proofs should be given two readings, except when otherwise designated. To insure accuracy, proofs requiring two readings shall not be read twice by the same team unless especially directed to do so.

Revising.

The importance of revising proofs well can not be overestimated. While a reviser is not expected to read proof, it is not enough for him to follow slavishly the marks found on the proof sheet. He should see that all corrections have been properly made in the type, that words or lines have not been transposed by the compositor in making the corrections, and that the rules governing spacing, division of words and good printing generally have been observed. The reader or reviser who passes bad spacing will be held at fault.

A reviser must not remodel the punctuation of the readers or make any important changes in the work. If he thinks that an important change should be made, he should submit the proposed change to the foreman.

All instructions on first proofs must be trans-

ferred to revised sheets.

Revisers should promptly notify the foreman of the proof room when variations from this Style Book are being made by readers.

The following rules should be carefully studied:

1. See that the proof sheets are clean and clear; send for another proof in case they are not.

2. See that galley slips connect before begin-

ning the page or press revise.

3. See that page folios are continuous, that running heads are correct and uniform, and that

the proper signature is correctly placed.

4. Revise carefully, observe connection between pages and carry all unanswered queries if the proof goes again to the author; otherwise see that all queries are answered, and take care that continued and repeated lines are free from errors.

5. If a revise is not properly corrected or is not reasonably free from error, call for another correction and proof (stating number wanted), and destroy all duplicates.

6. Be on the lookout for "doublets," "dropouts," and "transpositions," imperfect letters

or figures and "cold metal."

7. Read all running heads and box heads in continued tables; see that all leading lines are carried at the top where subordinate matter turns over; that dollar marks and captions of

columns are properly placed and uniform; that the matter is as compact as circumstances will permit, and that footnotes follow on the page containing the corresponding references and are

properly arranged.

8. Always make sure that different sets of proof sheets on any work are correctly marked in series, as "R," "2d R," "3d R," etc., and when a sheet is stamped "Another proof," carry the same designating "R" on the corresponding clean proof and destroy the stamped proof when it has served its purpose.

9. When two or more jobs are imposed in one form, the reviser should separate the parts to verify the imposition. Until familiar with the "fold," caution must be exercised in cutting the

sheet.

10. Press and stone revises are equally important. With these special care must be taken that rules do not lap, that work is not jammed in the "lockup," that damaged letters and "slips" are indicated, and that the matter is ready in all respects to pass severe criticism.

11. State publications are usually made up in

the following order:

Page 1, title; page 2, blank; page 3, table of contents; when contents ends on page 3, then page 4, blank; page 5, letter of transmittal; page 6, blank; page 7, introduction followed by text proper. Lists of illustrations or plates or figures where used should follow the contents.

In the body of the work new pages will be properly indicated on the proof sheet. Tables of contents, letters of transmittal, lists of illustrations, the text proper of a book, and all matter following half titles (except parallel

tables) should begin on a new odd page.

The legend lines of full-page cuts which run the broad way should read up; that is, the evenpage legend should be on the binding, or inside, margin, and the odd-page legend on the outside margin.

COMPOSITION STYLE.

The following rules and style are to be observed generally in the printing of all state documents. It is not presumed to cover all points, and judgment and discretion will need to be used in absence of specific instruction. Webster's Dictionary will be the accepted authority on all mooted questions.

Capitalization.

Capitalize (singular or plural)—

Proper names, or words used as such; also proper adjectives of same form.

Titles of rulers, legislative bodies and branches,

County when following name,

The California Legislature, but legislature,

senate, assembly, when standing alone.

The titles of state departments, commissions, bureaus, services, etc., when the title is expressed in full; but commission, board, department, etc., when standing alone.

All geographic terms when with the name (see

examples page 19).

Popular appellations, as Golden State, Bay

City, etc.

Nouns, pronouns, adjectives (except the articles "a," "an," and "the"), adverbs, verbs, and first and last words in upper and lower-case headings where the principal words are to be capitalized.

The principal words in addresses, signatures

and date lines.

The Army and Navy, when combined or alone;

but army and navy, when foreign.

Committees of the senate and assembly, and committees appointed by the Governor, or presiding officer.

All words denoting Deity, except "who,"

"whose," and "whom."

Names of foreign countries, titles of their rulers, legislative bodies, and dominion and administrative divisions, as German Empire, Emperor, Reichstag, Kingdom or Duchy.

Geographical names when following the proper name, as Canal, County, Creek, Gulch, Harbor, Island, Mountain, Ocean, Park, Township.

Geological ages, as Carboniferous, Cretaceous, Eocene, Miocene, Pliocene.

Government is not capitalized unless edited in

copy.

Upper or Lower only when a part of the name, as Lower California (Mexico): upper or lower when designating a part of a state or country.

State is not capitalized unless edited in copy. The, when part of a name, as The Adjutant

General, The Dalles.

Titles of books, historical documents, and the first word of quotations occurring within the text.

First word and proper nouns only of articles in books, magazines and newspapers, when referred to, and quote: "A story of frontier life in Humboldt County."

Section of the United States, as East, West, North, South, Middle West, Central West, Northwest, Southwest, Pacific Coast States, etc.

The group names of states, as North Atlantic, South Atlantic, Middle, Gulf, etc.; but eastern Middle, western Gulf, eastern manufacturers. western farmers, etc.

Do not capitalize—

State, except in titles. The court, the senate, the assembly, the legislature.

Street, avenue, road, lane, etc.

The noun in titles, except Government, Army and Navy. The Board of Agriculture, of Horticulture, the Civil Service Commission, etc., should be referred to as board or commission.

The names of districts, senatorial, assembly, congressional; also wards and precincts, as

fourth ward, third precinct.

Words of common usage whose proper form has been lost sight of, as chinaware, india ink, macadamized road, manila paper, russia leather; also adjectives and verbs ending in "ize," "ed." "ify," and "ing," when applied to products or processes, as harveyized, pasteurized, macadamized, etc.

College degrees, when spelled out, as degree of doctor of laws, degree of master of arts.

Branches of the government, as executive

judicial, legislative.

The name of the species in describing insects or plants.

Sections of states, as northern California,

central Ohio, etc.

Prepositions "d'," "da," "de," "della," "di," "l'," "van," "von," etc., when preceded by a forename; the same without a forename or title

should be capitalized.

Designations in connection with capital letters or roman numerals should be kept up, as Title XV, Chapter XII, Volume XI, etc.; but lower-case when used with figures, as chapter 10, volume 5, schedule No. 4, etc.; "Appendix," "Exhibit," "Form," and "Table," will be kept up in all cases when preceding numerals or figures.

In capitalization the distinction between a capital and a lower-case name is usually that between a proper and a common noun. Thus, Captain Jones has a capital C because the title Captain is virtually a part of his name; Jones, captain, has the title lower-cased because captain is a common-noun designation.

The following will illustrate the general style

regarding capitalization:

President Wilson was president of the caucus. The president of the Assembly was also present. but was not admired by the assembly. Color was given to the report that the fleet was in the offing, by Admiral Dewey (who was admiral of the fleet) appearing at the caucus. The Admiral appeared before the Speaker and asked who was the speaker, and was informed that he was the President, and also Chairman of the Committee on Rules, but that there were many chairmen. Many present came from the city of Boston; others from Mexico City; others from the region of San Francisco Bay; others from the bay of Chesapeake; others from the Bay of Fundy: some from the district of the river Platte, and others from the Mississippi River.

Use today, tomorrow, tonight as one word. Spell out figures from one to ten, and always when beginning a sentence. This applies to

when beginning a sentence. This applies to ordinary text, and not to descriptive or technical matter.

Omit ciphers in text where cents are not expressed—\$25 (not \$25.00). The same rule applies in designating time—thus 2 p.m. (not 2:00 p.m.). Use periods to separate hours and minutes, as 2.45 p.m., 9.15 a.m.

In dates omit d, th, and st when the year is given, as January 12, 1915; but the 12th day of January, or January 12th. (nd and rd are obsolete.) Spell out in "tenth" day of the

month.

Capitalization Guide.

Copy marked "Fol." means to follow signs, figures, italics, abbreviations, and idiomatic expressions, but the office style should be followed in capitalization, compounds, etc.

Copy marked "Fol. lit." means to follow liter-

ally throughout.

Names of vessels should be in italic, and where occurring in heads or cap lines, should be quoted but not italicized.

The words "see," "see also," should be in

italic when in indexes only.

As a rule italic should be followed as marked.

Follow copy on center heads, and in flush heads capitalize only the first word and proper nouns. Where side heads are run in, lower-case the words and end with a period. If followed by a dash, principal words go up.

Citations in text should be sentences, and in parentheses when occurring at end of a sentence.

Avoid frequent division of words, but keep spacing uniform.

Divide compound words at the hyphen only.

Avoid divisions in wide measures.

More than two consecutive divisions are not allowable.

Two-letter divisions will not be passed except

in very narrow measure.

Do not, if possible to prevent, make a division on the first or last lines of a paragraph. If compelled on the last line, run over not less than four letters.

Do not separate the initials in a name, or the abbreviated title from the name, or run over Esq., Jr., Sr.; nor separate a.m., p.m., A. D., N. Y., sec., p., No., or Rule from the accompanying number, or make any other incongruous separation. Do not have two consecutive lines beginning or ending with the same word, if possible to avoid, and not more than two under any circumstances; nor any line in wide measure ending with the article "a." (Leader and tabular matter are exceptions.)

Use three stars separated by an em quad to denote an ellipsis in text. If a full line of stars

is marked, use seven, indented two ems at each end of the line. Do not overrun stars at the end of paragraph.

Indentions should be uniform, as to paragraphs, hanging indentions, signatures, date lines, etc. Smaller type extracts should have the same indention in points as the text. Overruns may be any number of ems, to prevent conflict with other indentions, but should be uniform on a page. This also applies to total lines in leader matter. In indexes, where leaders are used, allow a

full em before the page figures; if the page figures extend back to the text, use an en quad. Indexes are to be the general text style, except that names of vessels go in roman, and "see,"

or "see also," go in italic. In resolutions, "Whereas," in the preamble, should be set in cap and small caps and begin a paragraph. "Therefore be it" should follow a colon and run in with the last "Whereas." Resolved. (followed by comma) should be in italic and the word following should be capitalized.

In firm names use & with names of individuals,

and spell out in companies, usually: but the certified name of the company or corporation should be followed. Use "and" in literary and

artistic composition.

Express numbers greater than 1,000 as, one thousand five hundred sixty dollars.

When two numbers occur together, as 20 10-inch guns, use twenty 10-inch guns.

Use superior figures for references and footnotes, and inferior figures in chemical formulas.

Use figures for decimals, and supply cipher where there is no unit, as 0.24, \$0.31 per lb.

Express amounts with figures used parenthetically thus: Three hundred dollars (\$300); ten (10) per cent; four (4) feet.

Spell the related numbers in beginning a sentence, as "Four or five hundred distinguished

persons were present."

Express distance in figures, as 50 miles, 18 yards, 10 feet 6 inches; but spell out fractions, as one-third mile.

Spell out amounts from one to ten, except enumerations of weight, measure, distance, clock time, money, percentage, degrees, votes, stocks,

bonds, and age.

Spell out months in texts and indexes, and abbreviate in tabular and leader work, footnotes and sidenotes when followed by day of month. Use Jan., Feb., Mar., Apr., Aug., Sept., Oct., Nov., Dec.; but May, June, July.

If descriptions of lands are copies of documents they should be followed verbatim. If discretion is to be used: N. $\frac{1}{2}$ Sec. 20, T. 7 N., R. 2 W., M. D. B. & M. When fractions are to be spelled, use half and quarter, not one-half. one-quarter.

ACCENTS.

Accents will be omitted in all state work, unless insisted upon by the author.

COMPOUND AND NONCOMPOUND WORDS.

Compound Words.

Follow Webster's Dictionary generally in the use or omission of the hyphen or space between words. The vocabulary of double words (p. 41) is inserted for convenient reference. It shows some variations which are to be followed. Compound adjectives generally take the hyphen.

Do not confuse a qualifying word with a subject word; for instance, a shoemaker may be a German shoemaker. If he makes wooden shoes, he is a wooden-shoe maker. Also observe the following forms: Young school-teacher, commonschool teacher, high-school teacher, public-school teacher, etc.

A present or past participle with a noun or an adjective may take a hyphen in such expressions as the following: Always wind-obeying deep; well-dealing countrymen; dark-working sorceress; soul-killing witches; fool-begging pa-

tience, etc.

Adverbs ending with "ly" are not usually compounded with the adjectives which they qualify, as a "nicely kept lawn." But words like "above," "ill," "well," "so," etc., are compounded in such expressions as "the well-known writer," "the so-called tariff reform," "this ill-advised expenditure," "the last-named article," etc.

Fractions, when spelled, should be compounded: One twenty-first, one-fifth, eighty-one one-hundredths, one one-hundredth, the one-hundredth part, one one-hundred-and-twentieth, two one-hundred-and-twenty-sixths.

When used adjectively, the expressions "first-class," "second-class," etc., are to be hyphenated; otherwise they should be printed as two words: A first-class passage, a first-class man, a man of the first class, a work of the second class, etc.

In such expressions as the "January-June period," "Washington-Baltimore improvement," etc., when used adjectively, use hyphens; but to indicate the elision of the word "to," in such expressions as "the period January-June," use an en dash.

Noncompound Words.

Omit the hyphen in civil and military titles, as Attorney General, Postmaster General, brigadier

general, lieutenant colonel, etc.

Omit the hyphen in such Latin forms as, "ex officio member," "ante bellum days," "prima facie evidence," "per diem employees," etc.; and also in such cases as "life (or fire) insurance company," "ocean mail lines," "railway rate legislation," "street car lines," etc.

Omit the hyphen in abbreviated terms except

"sec.-ft."

PUNCTUATION.

The comma separates two words of the same parts of speech and in the same construction, if used as a conjunction between them. Also, in a series of words, all of the same parts of speech, a comma is inserted between each, except where the conjunction and is used between the last two words of the series. Expressions of a parenthetical or immediate nature are separated from the context by a comma. A word or an expression denoting a person or an object addressed, is separated by a comma from the rest of the sentence.

The use of the comma, however, is largely a matter of individual preference; but its close use not being demanded by state work, it should not be insisted upon in any sentence that reads along connectedly, without a natural or radical break

in thought.

The semicolon is used for dividing a compound sentence into two or more parts, less closely connected than those which are separated by a comma, nor yet so little dependent on each other as those distinguished by a colon.

In thin-spaced lines, the space after the semi-

colon should be slightly increased.

The colon is used to divide a sentence into two or more parts less closely connected than those which are separated by a semicolon, but not so independent as separate, distinct sentences.

The colon should never be used with a dash or other point, even in the case of abbreviations.

Increase space after the colon as required.

The period is used when a sentence is complete and independent, and not connected in construction with a following sentence.

Use an em quad after a period ending a sen-

tence; not a spaceband and an en space.

The dash is introduced where the sentence breaks off abruptly, where a significant pause is required, or where there is an unexpected turn in the sentiment.

The dash should never be used with any other point (except at the end of a side heading or paragraph), and never at the beginning of the

line.

The interrogation is used at the end of an interrogative sentence; that is, when a question

is asked; as, Who will accompany me?

The exclamation is applied to expressions of sudden surprise, emotion, etc., and also to address and invocation; as, My friend! your conduct amazes me!

Parentheses are used to include a word or clause containing some necessary information, or useful remark introduced into the body of a sentence obliquely, and which might be omitted without injuring the construction. Dashes are also used quite frequently for the same purpose as marks of parenthesis.

When a sentence is divided, and a parenthetical word, remark, or clause thrown in, the division points should be placed after the parentheses. Place the period within the parentheses

only when they include a sentence.

Brackets are used within parentheses to hold explanatory words, etc., and to include words or remarks foreign to the sentence, as [laughter],

| indicating |.

Quotation marks should be placed after exclamation or interrogation marks when the punctuation sign is part of the sentence, otherwise before, as with the semicolon and colon. Always place after comma and period. He said, "Is it right?" Have you read "Three Squeaks"? "Help! Murder!" cried the unfortunate wretch as he fled from these interrogations.

Excerpts or extracts from law or decisions should be quoted at beginning and end, and at beginning of each paragraph, whether indented or set in smaller type, unless it be the language of the author, used on a previous occasion. Do not use quotations when the extract is dated and

signed.

A quotation within a quotation should be single quoted; but a quotation within a single

quotation takes the double mark.

Possessives and Apostrophes. Nonns in the singular, or in the plural, when ending with any letter other than "s," require an apostrophe and "s," as, man's, men's, child's, children's. When singular or plural nouns end in "s," only the apostrophe after the "s" is necessary, as Burns', Jones', witness' testimony, witnesses' testimony. Avoid the use of the apostrophe unless the idea of possession is very clear. Such words as peoples, merchants, farmers, in peoples forum, merchants exchange, or farmers union, do not require the possessive.

Omit the apostrophe in all abbreviations or

contractions, as, Fredk., or contd.

Omit comma in James Lind of Sacramento; Mr. and Mrs. Van Houston of Woodland; J. W. Goodman of San Jose.

Omit period after letters or figures used for subdivisions, when placed in parentheses; as, (a), (b), (3); (1), (2), (3). When not used with parentheses, use period and an en space.

Omit the hyphen in civil and military titles, as Attorney General, Postmaster General, lieutenant colonel, etc., also in Latin forms, as ex officio, ante bellum, prima facie, per diem, etc.; also in abbreviated terms.

BRIEFS AND TRANSCRIPTS.

In briefs follow copy generally in the use of abbreviations, figures, and other important matters. In capitalization and punctuation the office style will prevail.

Indent extracts $1\frac{1}{2}$ ems, and citations 2 ems,

with 3-em breakover.

Quote extracts at the beginning of each paragraph, and at the end of the last paragraph of extract proper. Follow extracts literally except in capitalization and punctuation.

Use vs. (roman) for versus.

Italicize the titles of cases, as State of California vs. Southern Pacific Company; Southern Pacific case (238 Cal. 118).

When quoting from the transcript, follow lit-

erally.

Use caps and small-caps for subheads, as

Capitalize court only with the name, as, Circuit Court, Supreme Court; but the court rules; the court say. Capitalize judge likewise, as, Judge Morrow, Morrow, J.; but the judge says; the judge ruled.

MAKE-UP AND IMPOSITION.

Make-up should be standardized as far as possible, using standard furniture and margins.

Page justification needs to be firm with a uniform swell. Use twin gauges.

Make all pages full, if possible.

In initial work, the size of the trimmed book should be known, for this determines the size of the type page. The margin should be divided so as to allow, usually, one pica more at the bottom and sides than at the top and back.

When center folios are used, —1—, —2—, —3—, is style for the top, and (1), (2), (3), in a smaller type than the text, style for the bottom of pages.

Much care should be taken in "whitening out," balance, sinking and break-overs.

The sink at the head of each new page should be uniform throughout the book.

Do not break on a hyphen or on one line.

Do not run over one line.

"Contents," "List of Illustrations," "Letter of Transmittal," or any other matter that makes a page in itself, should be placed slightly above the center of the page.

All caption lines should have more space above than below.

See that the signature marks and closing mark are always used.

State publications are usually made up in the following order: Page 1, title; page 2, blank; page 3, table of contents; when contents end on page 3, then page 4 is blank; page 5, letter of transmittal; page 6, blank; page 7, text proper.

In side-stitched books, an extra pica should be allowed in center margin.

Pamphlets up to 64 pages should be imposed as an insert (or saddle stitch).

Pertaining to Senate and Assembly Journals.

General Rules.

The body type of the Journals is 10-point. All communications, resolutions, statements, roll calls, reports, and extracts will be set in 7-point. This rule obtains whether the copy is marked or not.

Indent star lines 2 ems on each side. Use seven stars. When ellipsis occurs Do not quote any communication that carries date and signature.

In Senator's or Member's language, when the copy indicates "number." use the abbreviation "No."; when the word is "numbered," use that form. In reference to Senate or Assembly bills the "No." should always be used, whether in copy or not, inside of line, use three stars.

The only italic used is in new matter in amended bills, the enacting clause, the letter used in additional sections, as 1764a, and in resolutions, "Kesolved by the Senate of the State of California, the Assembly concurring."

Italicize First, Second. Third, when followed by a dash and paragraphed. roman when followed by a comma or period.

In bills, after first section it is abbreviated to SEC. The section (\$) mark is used

only in code sections

Figures will be used in expressing sections, subdivisions, and time. Paragraphs of subdivisions will be expressed as "First," "Second," etc., as "Paragraph second of subdivision 3 of section 196 of an act relating to the depositing of one hundred thou-

sand dollars, on July 1, 1915, the same to draw interest at the rate of six per cent." 

Sec. 3. Section 37140 of the Political Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

The board of pervisors of each county must, on the last Monday of August of each year, fix the rate of county taxes, designating the number of cents levied for each fund on each one hundred dollars of property, and must levy the state and county taxes upon the taxable property in the county; provided, that it shall not be lawful for any board of supervisors of any county in the state to levy, nor shall any tax greater than fifty cents on each one hundred dollars of property be levied and collected in any one year, to pay the bonded indebtedness, or judgment arising therefrom, of this state, or of any county or municipality in this state.
