

Rock music fans will never stop arguing about this!






Buddy Holly was the first musician to use two guitars, **bass**, and drums in his band.

CHAPTER 2 HOW IT ALL BEGAN

Rock and roll came from mixing country music and the blues.

The blues belonged to African-American musicians. It came from songs sung by African-American farm workers.





Robert Johnson was a gifted Delta blues guitarist.

The Delta blues was a type of blues music played by musicians in the Mississippi Delta area.

Johnson only recorded 29 songs. He died in 1938 when he was just 27.

Johnson's music would influence future musicians such as the Rolling Stones, Cream, and later, Eric Clapton.







In the 1950s, musicians began mixing the blues and country music to create something new—rock and roll.

On May 10, 1954, a band leader named Bill Haley recorded a song. It was called (We're Gonna) Rock Around the Clock.

Many people think this was the first rock and roll song.





No one had ever heard anything like Elvis before—young people loved him! However, their parents did not like his loud music and dancing.


During his career, Elvis spent 80 weeks at the top of the music charts. He became known as "The King" to his fans.

The electric guitar became the main sound in this new style of music.




Eric Clapton playing a later model Fender Stratocaster

Electric guitars were built by craftsmen in tiny workshops. Little did they know that these carved pieces of wood would become so important to rock and roll music.

CHAPTER 3 THE 1960s

Many people believe that the 1960s was the best time in rock and roll's history.

In California, the Beach Boys were singing about surfers, the beaches, hot rod cars, and young love.



English bands such as the Yardbirds, the Animals, and the Kinks were playing a type of English blues.

In Liverpool, England, four young musicians got together. They formed a band called The Beatles, which became one of the most famous bands in rock history.

Liverpool is a port city. In the 1960s, local sailors were bringing back records from America.

The Beatles were influenced by American artists, such as Chuck Berry and Elvis. The Beatles were one of the first groups to write their own songs. Their vocals and **vocal harmonies** made every song fresh and different.



The Who was an English band. They came out of a movement called "the Mods."

The Mods were English teenagers. They drove scooters and wore the latest fashions from London.

The Who's sound was built around the songs and guitar playing of leader Pete Townshend.




Townshend became famous for smashing up his guitars on stage.




The Rolling Stones were another English band that listened to American blues.


Singer Mick Jagger and guitarist Keith Richards created a sound that was much bluesier than The Beatles.



The Rolling Stones are still touring today!

The Beatles, The Who, and the Rolling Stones all toured America and became successful in the U.S. In America, this was called the "British Invasion."






In 1967, the **Vietnam War** was raging.

Many young people were anti-war. They wanted a new way to live that promoted love and peace. Many young people became "hippies." They listened to psychedelic rock bands such as Quicksilver Messenger Service and Jefferson Airplane.

In the late 1960s, guitar players were beginning to take the electric guitar to new limits. They used effects such as fuzz and wah-wah pedals. The "Guitar Hero" was born.

CHAPTER 4 THE 1970s

In the 1970s, heavy metal bands created huge walls of sound by turning amplifiers up to ten!

> Jimmy Page was a studio guitarist. He wanted to put together a band that would rule the world.


> > Led Zeppelin was that band. They wrote amazing songs and were gifted musicians.

Progressive rock bands, such as Pink Floyd, were also emerging.

Progressive rock was more complex than normal rock. Bands used bits of classical music. They used keyboards to create the sounds of instruments such as violins and horns.

In March 1973, Pink Floyd released *The Dark Side of the Moon*. The album stayed on the U.S. charts for 14 years!

The 1970s was also famous for "glam rock."

Bands such as the Sweet and T. Rex wore sequins, satin, make-up, and six-inch (15 cm) heels.




David Bowie used pop and even theater in his music. When he performed he turned himself into different characters, such as Ziggy Stardust and the Thin White Duke. He used make-up and costumes to create these characters.

Then, in 1974, a new style of rock music was born in London—punk rock.

The guitars were out of tune. There were no melodies.

Sometimes the singer was singing one song while the band played another. Punk rock was anti-music!


England's Sex Pistols and The Clash were the most popular punk groups.



CHAPTER 5 THE 1980s

On August 1, 1981, MTV (Music Television) came on the air.

Musicians were now making videos of their performances. Now more than ever, a band's "look" was just as




Bands such as Bon Jovi, Mötley Crüe, and Van Halen looked great on TV. Their music became known as "hair metal" or "glam metal."

Guitarist Eddie Van Halen was a true guitar master. Other guitarists were amazed by his guitar skills.

In England, heavy metal groups such as Def Leppard, Iron Maiden, and Saxon became popular.

Their music was called the New Wave of British Heavy Metal (NWOBHM).



In the 1980s, the Irish band U2 had a major impact on rock music. Their music was built around the voice and songs of Bono, and the guitar sounds of The Edge.

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CHAPTER 6 THE 1990s


In the cloudy, rainy city of Seattle, Washington, "grunge" was born.

Grunge was a little bit punk, a little bit heavy metal. Grunge musicians wore shabby clothes.

The music was moody-sounding. The songs were usually about being unhappy with yourself and the world around you.

Bands such as Alice in Chains, Soundgarden, Pearl Jam, and Nirvana played grunge music.





In the UK, "Britpop" bands brought back the sounds of the Beatles, the Rolling Stones, and the Kinks.

The songs were catchy, and you could sing along to all the **lyrics**.



CHAPTER 7 ROCK TODAY

Today, the rock music of the past continues to influence new musicians.


Thrash metal bands, such as Mastodon and Slipknot, have been influenced by Led Zeppelin, Black Sabbath, and Iron Maiden.

Radiohead are a modern-day Pink Floyd.

Bands such as The Killers, Interpol, and the Editors are taking the punk rock of the 1970s and turning it into something new.



Grunge has become post-grunge with bands such as the Foo Fighters, Collective Soul, and Seether.



Female artists such as KT Tunstall, Alanis Morissette, and Gwen Stefani have been influenced by many styles of music including punk.

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NEED-TO-KNOW WORDS

amplifier A piece of equipment that makes sounds louder. An electric guitar is plugged into an amplifier

bass A type of electric guitar with four strings and a lower sound than a normal electric guitar

country music A style of American music that began in the 1940s. It was originally played by poor, white musicians. It mixed little bits of the blues and folk music

Delta blues Blues music played by musicians living in the Mississippi Delta area

folk rock A simple style of music usually played by a single singer with a guitar. The songs are about the life of the singer and their community. Folk songs were a way to pass along history

fuzz A piece of equipment used with an electric guitar to make a fuzzy sound. The musician operates the equipment using a pedal

heavy metal A style of music with loud guitars and big amplifiers. The heavy metal singing style is almost like screaming **influence** When one thing shapes or has an effect on something else

legend A story that is passed down through history and may be partly true and partly made up. Also, a person who has done something great and is remembered through history

lyrics The words of a song

record label A record company

Vietnam war A war in Asia between South Vietnam and North Vietnam. The war lasted from 1954 until 1975. America joined the war to help the South Vietnam army

vocal The singing part of a song

vocal harmony A singing part of a song that is different to the main vocal but blends with it to create a new sound

wah-wah pedal A
piece of equipment used
with an electric guitar to
make a sound like crying.
The musician operates the
equipment using a pedal

MORE ROCK STYLES

- New Wave—In the late 1970s, bands such as Blondie, Talking Heads, and The Police turned punk rock into a music style that more people could enjoy and buy. This music was known as New Wave.
- Goth rock—The Cure played goth rock. They dressed up in black and looked like vampires.
- Garage rock—This style of music was played and recorded in garages in the

- 1960s. Today, it's back with bands such as The Hives and the White Stripes.
- College rock—This music grew up on college campuses across the U.S. and in the UK. College rock was a little bit punk and a little bit New Wave. It had a lot more melody, however. College rock bands include XTC, Edie Brickell and the New Bohemians, 10,000 Maniacs, and R.F.M.
