



EXTRACT OF LAWS RELATING TO LABOR AND FACTORIES.

§ 94. Tenant-factories.—A tenant-factory within the meaning of the term as used in this chapter is a building, separate parts of which are occupied and used by different persons, companies or corporations, and one or more of which parts is so used as to constitute in law a factory. The owner, whether or not he is also one of the occupants, instead of the respective lessees or tenants shall be responsible for the observ-But as an alternative to providing water-closets within each factory as aforesaid, the owner may provide in public hallways or other parts of the premises used in common, where they will be at all times readily and conveniently accessible to all persons employed on the premises not provided for in accordance with section eighty-eight, separate water-closets for each sex, of sufficient number to accommodate all such persons. Such owner shall keep all water-closets located as last specified at all times provided with proper fastenings, and properly screened, lighted, ventilated clean, sanitary and free from all obscene writing or marking. Outdoor water-closets shall only be permitted where the commissioner of labor shall decide that they are necessary or preferable, and they shall then be provided in all respects in accordance with his directions. EXTRACT OF LAWS RELATING TO LABOR IN FACTORIES.

Section 81. **Protection of Employees Operating Machinery.**—The owner or person in charge of a factory where machinery is used, shall provide, in the discretion of the commissioner of labor, belt shifters or other ery shall be provided with loose pulleys. All vats, pans, saws, planers, cogs, gearing, belting, shafting, set-screws and machinery, of every description, shall be properly guarded. No person shall remove or make ineffective any safeguard around or attached to the machinery, vats or pans, while the same are in use, unless for the purpose a dangerous condition or is not properly guarded, the use thereof may be prohibited by the commissioner of labor and a notice to that effect shall be attached thereto. Such notice shall not be removed until the machine is made safe and the required safeguards are provided, and in the meantime such unsafe or dangerous machinery shall not be used. When in the opinion of the commissioner of labor it is necessary, the workrooms, halls and stairs leading to the workrooms shall be properly lighted, and in cities of the first class, if deemed necessary by the fans of sufficient power shall be provided for the purpose of carrying off dust from emery wheels, grind stones and other machinery creating dust; except where in the case of woodworking machinery, the commissioner of labor after first making and filing in the public records of his office a written statements of the reasons therefor shall mechanical contrivances for the purpose of throwing on or off belts on pulleys. THE WORLD'S GOLD PRODUCT for 1904, according to an estimate recently issued by Mr. ROBERTS, the Director of the

United States Mint, amounts to \$347,150,700, or a gain of about \$25,000,000 over the figures for 1903.

This constant gain in the output of gold would seem to point to the wisdom of using a larger proportion of gold or its paper representative, as a circulating medium. Although the stock of gold held in the United States has enormously increased in recent years, but little gold is seen in actual circulation. It is no doubt true that there is a popular preference for paper as against coin. But the paper in actual hand-to-hand circulation does not consist of gold certificates, the latter not being issued in denominations below \$20, but of legal-tenders, National bank notes and silver certificates, the latter apparently pre-

dominating. Of course, where large payments are made, a greater proportion of gold certificates will appear.

The use of gold coin as a circulating medium results in some loss, owing to the abrasion of the coins; and since the "limit of tolerance" of abraded coins is a narrow one, this further tends to make gold unpopular. In communities where gold coin is more largely used than in the part of the United States west of the Mississippi River, there is perhaps less of a disposition to be on the lookout for light-weight pieces. Where the habits of the people have accustomed them to the use of paper, this form of money is doubtless preferred to the coin, on the score of convenience.

The world's gold product for 1904, according to an estimate recently issued by Mr. Roberts, the Director of the United States Mint, amounts to \$347,150,700, or a gain of about \$25,000,000 over the figures for 1903.

This constant gain in the output of gold would seem to point to the circulating medium.
